

Taking on the SLOPES

Speeding down a snow-topped mountain on a piece, or couple pieces, of wood in the cold, wet, slippery snow can be intimidating, so a pleasant first-time experience can make all the difference down the road. Luckily for us, there are many family-friendly ski resorts conveniently located outside of Sacramento; each has beginner programs that teach important skills to successfully conquer the slopes.

Tahoe Donner

Just about an hour-and-a-half drive from Sacramento is Tahoe Donner. Donner has wide-open bowls, uncrowded slopes, excellent grooming and courteous staff. Children are important guests at Donner, and the programs cater toward the overall learning and skiing experience.

Snowflakes Kids Ski School is for youngsters ages 3 to 6. On weekends, Tahoe Donner offers four twohour sessions to teach five levels of little ones, from "never-evers" to "little rippers." The Snowflakes Ski School has dedicated instructors, its own meeting room filled with kids stuff, a low student-to-instructor ratio and kids ski equipment. Children must be at least 3 years of age, potty-trained and willing to ski.

Tahoe Donner Tykes is a midweek program for children ages 3 to 6 looking to spend time on the slopes every week.

"Our mission for this program is to focus on the fundamentals of skiing in a fun and exciting way," says Jill Cisowski, Snowflakes Supervisor. "Tahoe Donner Tykes is an extremely popular program with limited availability."

Donner Tykes sessions are twoand-a-half hours, offered in the morning or afternoon on Wednesdays or Thursdays; the sessions begin the second week in January and continue through the last week in March.

Northstar-at-Tahoe Resort

"Northstar-at-Tahoe Resort offers a variety of programs designed to help families get out on the mountain and have some fun skiing and riding," says Northstar and Sierra Resorts public relations representative Jessica VanPernis. is the same price as a regular fullday adult lift ticket. The interchangeable Parent Predicament lift ticket allows parents to share a lift ticket for the day. As one parent skis or snowboards, the other parent stays with the child until ready to trade off.


Northstar Resort offers Burton Snowboards' Learn-to-Ride program; the program uses beginnerspecific equipment and is designed to help newcomers learn how to snowboard. The Burton Progression Park introduces riders to freestyle terrain with rails and fun boxes just inches off the snow, allowing riders to get the feeling of air for the first time in a comfortable setting.

Sierra-at-Tahoe Snowsport Resort is conveniently located on Highway 50, 12 miles west of South Lake Tahoe and offers complimentary shuttle service daily.

Befu says it has separate programs and the lessons are separated by age. She adds that it is a bit more comfortable for the little ones that way and "cooler" for the older children to hang out with kids their own age.

Last year was the first year it introduced educational fun parks for children; kids climb in and out of caves and tree houses while learning history and fun facts. It also offers Wild Mountain Ski and Snowboard School for children ages 3 to 12. This season, Sierra improved the Wild Mountain check-in process by dividing its ski school drop-offs into two separate areas for 3- to 6-year-olds and 7- to 12-year-olds.

Programs such as value pricing on children's lift tickets and the Parent Predicament lift ticket also makes it easy for families at the resort.

Soda Springs Mountain Resort

According to Rachael Woods, public relations manager for Alpine Meadows, Boreal and Soda Springs Winter Ski & Snowboard Resorts, visitors may not find many pro-skiers and riders at Soda Springs on a daily basis but instead will find some of the most "stoked" people to ever set foot on snow.

Soda Springs offers skiing and snowboarding for all ability levels, accessible via Lion's Head chair lift, an innertube carousel ride for small children and tubing lanes for all ages. Soda specializes in introducing kids and adults, some who have never been on snow, to winter sports.

Kirkwood Resort

A couple hours east of Sacramento, traveling on Route 16 to 49 South and then 88 East through Jackson, families can discover Kirkwood. Every member of the family can enjoy Kirkwood's new programs, equip-

Kids of all ages can find a terrain park to match their ability and desire at one of Kirkwood's three expanded terrain parks. AdventureLand, located in Timber Creek, is perfect for young children with its gentle rollers and ski-through tunnels.

"New this year, all of our first-time ski and ride programs start inside," says Mullens. "The children play games, watch specially designed instructional videos and begin their experiences on familiar ground. The program has been specially designed at Kirkwood and signals a new exciting approach to teaching first-time skiers and snowboarders. The program helps accelerate the learning process and guarantees a fun and exciting experience for your child."
